A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Hyderabad Karnataka Education Society, Gulbarga

The Hyderabad Karnataka Education Society was established by Late Sri. Mahadevappa Rampure, the founder president in the year 1958 with a pious object of providing educational facilities specially in the professional courses to the people of North part of the Karnataka, a backward region consisting of Gulbarga, Bidar, Yadgir, Raichur and Koppal districts. He has rightly identified the need of accelerating Socio-economic conditions of the area through Sri. Mahadevappa Rampure established 13 institutions of higher learning of different types in different parts of Hyderabad Karnataka area including Bangalore, the capital city within a period of 14 years.

Today the society runs over 48 institutions of higher education in different faculties like Medical, Engineering, Dental, Pharmacy, Homeopathic, Nursing, Law, Management, Education, Arts, Science, Commerce and Home science with a separate women's college. All the past Presidents and Governing Council Members of the society have strived their level best to build the society with necessary infrastructure, latest equipments and regular repairs and renovations of the existing buildings.

Late Sri. Mahadevappa Rampure's Social concern, sacrificing nature, vision, courage, dream, plan and initiation benefits are the fruits being reaped even today and in days to come.

About Aland:

Aland is a Taluka headquarter lying on Gulbarga-Solapur state highway. It is located in the north-east region of Gulbarga district and falls on the border area of Maharashtra.

Hanuman Temple, Sharana Ekantramayya Temple and Ladle Mashak Darga are the holy places of Aland. Basically Aland comes under backward Hyderabad Karnataka region. Before independence it was under the rule of Hyderabad Nizam. After independence it was included in Indian Union on Semptember 17, 1948. Ancient Temple of Lord Kshemalingeshwara of Kshetrapal near village Narona is 30km away from Aland. This place has divinely thatched natural beauty and is also called Dakshina Kashi. People of Aland Taluka are basically agriculturists and most of the farmers grow vegetables, kharif, rabi crops, grapes and sugar cane. It is also called the bowl of sugar. Recently Central University has been established on the way from Gulbarga to Aland at village Kadaganchi.

About The College: H.K.E. Society's A. V. Patil Arts, Science & Commerce College, Aland.

The H.K.E. Society's A.V. Patil Arts, Science & Commerce College was established at Aland in the year 1980 by the then President Dr. A. B. Malakareddy with the help of local MLA late Sri. A.V. Patil. It is located on Maharashtra Karnataka border and is 45km away from the district headquarter Gulbarga.

The college has 17 acres of land lying at the outskirt of town. The founders and pioneers of the institution had a vision to impart higher education to the children of rural and backward, SC/ST and minority people and create interest in them and to encourage the teachers to undertake research work.

With the above objectives in mind the college has developed well equipped laboratories, network resource center, Commerce lab, Language lab, ICT facility, Career and counseling cell, Gymnasium, Women hostel, Staff room and Library with more than 28,000 books. It has vast playground with volleyball, kho-kho and kabaddi courts. It has 1302 students strength. 44% of which are girl students. The performance of students in academic, cultural, games and sports activity has been considerably good.

The college is affiliated to Gulbarga University, Gulbarga and recognized by the UGC under section 2(f) of UGC Act in 1982 and under section 12(B) in 1990. It is a grant in aid college.

The college has been assessed by the executive committee of NAAC peer team on 17.10.2006 and accredited with 'B' grade.

Since the last accreditation of the college we have made sincere efforts to improve the quality and tried our level best to implement the recommendations made by the NAAC peer team. We are on the right path in developing necessary infrastructure, creating necessary atmosphere for enhancement of research aptitude of the faculty and overall personality development of the students with social commitment through extension activities. The following are some of the major achievements made during this period.

- 1) Career and Counseling cell has been established under the financial assistance of UGC XI plan. Since then the cell has been conducting coaching classes for various competitive examinations, organizing campus interviews and special lectures by eminent resource persons.
- 2) Network resource center is established under the UGC scheme. It has six computers with high speed broad band connectivity and one printer. The students are getting benefit of the NRC.

- 3) ICT facility of the college has been enhanced by installing two smart boards along with CPUs, projectors and audio systems to acquaint the rural students with the modern teaching technology. Faculties are now taking the help of this latest technology to make their teaching more effective.
- 4) We have received fund from UGC for conducting remedial classes for the SC/ST/Minority/OBC students. Under this scheme classes are conducted every year by inviting resource persons and subject experts on various topics.
- 5) Commerce lab has been established with six computers and one printer.
- 6) Establishment of English Language lab and Mathematics lab is under progress.
- 7) Women's hostel and Gymnasium is constructed and established.
- 8) Toilet is constructed for the disabled under UGC fund.
- 9) A spacious seminar hall (Auditorium) is constructed.

We are quite aware of the strengths and weaknesses of the institution identified by the peer team and accordingly sincere efforts have been made during the last 5 years to overcome the weaknesses. The institution has improved in all respects and submits itself to NAAC for re-accreditation.

SWOC Analysis

Strengths:

- The college has sincere, dedicated and committed faculty.
- The college is located in the vast area of 17 acres land with natural greenery.
- Conducts various extension and awareness programmes.
- Encourages research culture among faculty and students. The staff are encouraged to pursue M.Phil., Ph.D. and to take up major and minor research projects.
- The college has well established library having 28,000 reference books, journals, periodicals etc.
- Fully furnished science labs and computer labs are connected with broad band internet.
- Field trips, study tours and interaction with experts in various fields.

Weaknesses:

- Most of the students of the college belong to socially and economically weaker sections of the society.
- Due to rural background of the students they are poor in English language.
- Most of the meritorious P.U. Science students opt to join professional courses like Engineering, medicine etc. The remaining students invariably join UG course.
- Most of the students travel from surrounding remote villages to the college which consumes lot of their time affecting their performance.

Opportunities:

- To encourage faculty in research activities.
- Effort to achieve the college with potential excellence (CPE) status.
- To Collaborate with agencies for offering consultancy services in the field of banking and industry.

Threats/Challenges:

- Competition from nearby colleges.
- As most of the students earn while learn to support the family while studying, consequently their levels of concentration on studies and attendance percentage are low.
- Motivating the students to participate in extra and co-curricular activities.

- To motivate the students to develop the attitudes like hard work, discipline, self confidence and sense of social responsibility through N.S.S and N.C.C units.

The institution prepares, develops and deploys action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum in the following ways.

- The principal of the college in consultation with all the faculty members prepares the schedule of academic calendar before the commencement of the academic session.
- We have formed different committees such as admission, time table, Internal assessment Examinations, Sports & Cultural activities, Grievance Redressal Cell and Library Committee and Discipline and Anti Ragging Committee etc. for the smooth functioning of the institution.
- Every teacher prepares his/her annual teaching plan, annual academic calendar and individual time table for the academic schedule.
- Concerned department head along with their colleagues divide the university syllabi according to the action plan.
- The progress of teaching and learning is reviewed every month by head of the institution.
- Copy of the curriculum is circulated to all the heads of the departments and library for student's reference in the beginning of the academic session.

- According to the Gulbarga University guidelines the courses are divided into two semesters of 'June to October' and 'December to April' i.e., odd and even Sem.
- Along with the prescribed syllabus, relevant reference books and text books are recommended by the faculty to students.
- The students are made familiar with advanced knowledge, techniques and skills through seminars, educational tours etc.
- The classroom teaching is made more effective and interactive through the use of modern teaching aids such as computer, internet, OHP, LCD projectors and smart boards.

- The curricula of the college is developed and restructured according to the Gulbarga University guidelines.
- The curricula are prepared by members of the Board of Studies (BOS) incorporating the feedback from all the stake holders.
- The college has well equipped library with textbooks, reference books, journals, periodicals etc for the up gradation of teacher's knowledge.
- The institution encourages the teachers to organize seminars, conferences and workshops at state and national level.
- Institution supports morally to attend seminars, conference, workshops etc. to enhance their knowledge base.
- The faculties attend different orientation and refresher courses to upgrade their subject knowledge.
- The management organizes training programmes for the teaching and non teaching staff in the use of computers, internet, audio-visual aids, smart board etc. for improving their skills effectively.
- The college has network resource center, commerce lab and language lab with total 18 computers having latest configuration and multimedia facilities.
- Internet is accessible round the clock at the college laboratories, library, IQAC centre and at UGC network resource centre.
- The college has provided LCD projectors, Smart boards, Laptops and OHPs to the teachers for effective teaching-learning process.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the Institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

- The term wise division of curriculum is made in the beginning of academic session by the teachers in consultation with HOD.
- The head of the institution monitors the implementation and progress of curriculum in the staff meeting conducted every month.
- In order to meet the demands of computer and IT related part of syllabi. the college has three laboratories with 18 computers.
- In addition to reference books and journals, the circulars of syllabi and question paper sets of examinations held previously by University are also made available to students.
- College library has more than 28,000 books, journals and news papers. Students are properly guided and encouraged to visit the library for their knowledge upgradation.
- Teachers are given necessary training to use ICT technology such as computers, OHP, projectors, smart boards. Etc.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The institutions network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry and the University in effective operationalization of the curriculum as follows

With Industry:

- Workshops and lectures by the industry persons are conducted. e.g. State Industrial Board, Department of Industry and Commerce, Banks etc.
- Industrial visits/tours are arranged every year by various departments of the college for the students.
- In the curriculum of science subjects attention is given to students practical topics such as chemistry, quality control, analytical work as they are having relevance in the practical field of the industries. The experiments helpful in the industrial works are included in the curriculum.
- As a result of industrial interaction many firms have held campus selection in our institution. For e.g., ACC industry sent a team of their experts to our institute for campus interview in 2011 & 2012. After completing the formal process 6 candidates were finally selected and employed in our state and outside the state also.

• Through cultural advisor, sport teacher, NSS officer, NCC officer and examination incharge, HOD of all departments will interact with beneficiaries about curriculum and training programmes.

With University:

- Our faculties are the members different academic bodies of Gulbarga University, Gulbarga such as BOS, BOE etc.
- The revision of the syllabus is made by the University on the basis of feedback received from the students, employers, alumni, industry and academic peers in addition to the requirements of the job market.

UGC has sanctioned Career Oriented Course (COC) on 'Vermiculture'.

Need Assessment:

Organic waste, a challenge for disposal, a serious environmental pollutant and a great social nuisance can be converted, using simple techniques into useful and valuable product known as 'Vermicompost'.

Vermicompost is an organic form of fertilizer with all beneficial properties of inorganic fertilizer but is free from the harmful effects on soil and human health. In recent past with popularity of organic farming is gaining, demand for organic fertilizers is increasing. The scope for betterment of soil health using vermicompost and globalization of our economy has opened up new vistas of business opportunity to commercially produce this commodity of multiple social and economic value.

In light of the aforesaid facts this course has been introduced under the UGC scheme.

Design, Development and Planning:

The college has to prepare the syllabus for itself and get it approved from the University. For this purpose the following procedure was followed.

- The syllabus was framed by following members.
 - 1. Prof. D.C. Gadagade, Principal
 - 2. Prof. N.S. Wali, Head, Dept. of Zoology
- These members prepared the syllabus in consultation with University
- The prepared syllabus was sent to the University academic council for approval.
- After due sanction from the University, the syllabus was introduced in the college for the course.

IQAC of the college strives hard to ensure quality in the implementation and effective results of the curricula.

The faculty see to it that not only theoretical knowledge is imparted through lectures but also it leads to the total development of students personality. The faculty attempt to make it more practical oriented and relevant to the real life conditions. Curriculum is usually deigned on the basis of needs from various industries and suggestions from academic bodies Research centre and Universities, its objectives will be achieved in the course of implementation.

The college has made following efforts to supplement the University's curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated

- 1. We had a sugar technology subject in B.Sc. which is introduced to develop the scientific knowledge of sugar cane cultivation and to meet the demand of the local sugar factory in the Taluka. Presently this course is closed.
- 2. As most of the students of the college are from villages, they are very poor in English. To improve the communication skills in English special lectures and seminars are conducted regularly along with spoken English classes.
- 3. Faculties are encouraged to take up innovative research projects.
- 4. While going through curricula in the classroom the faculty attempts to make it more practical and relevant to the real life conditions.
- 5. As the college is situated in rural area, providing opportunities to students from disadvantaged sections of the society is one the goals of the institution. Out of total students strength, 25% belongs to SC and ST and the female students strength is 42%.
- 6. ICT based teaching is adopted with the help of computer, smart board and internet.
- 7. For the development of cooperation, character and leadership educational tours and field visits are organized.
- 8. Awareness about social issues is created by observation of important days and celebrating birth anniversaries of important personalities.
- 9. Seminars and Camps like blood donation camp, AIDS awareness, women empowerment, voter awareness etc. are organized by NSS and NCC to address the needs of society.
- 10. Participation of students in Zonal sports, University and Inter-University level sports events provide opportunity for their personality development.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

In order to cater to the needs of the competitive employment market, the institution has following activities to help the students.

- 1. Under the Career and Counseling cell the college is imparting training in different skills namely communication skills, analytical skills, soft skills, computer skills etc.
- 2. Many of our college students attended the pool campus interviews organized by many companies like ACC, ICICI and Infosys etc., and as many as 08 students got selected during this campus interview.

1.1.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum?

Gender Issues

- Special lectures are organized by eminent persons on issues like female feticide, women empowerment, gender discrimination etc.
- Organization of rally on women literacy.
- Seminar and workshops are organized on various cross cutting issues

Climate change and Environmental Education

- Gulbarga University has introduced Environmental Studies as an independent and compulsory subject of study at B.A. III semester and B.Sc., B.Com IV semester level.
- The campus is made eco friendly by tree plantation in large number. Different varieties of timber, medicinal and ornamental trees are grown. New saplings are planted regularly. Heavy vehicles are prohibited in the campus. Six big carpet lawns, 400 trees of different varieties are developed and maintained by water harvesting in the campus.
- The NSS unit of our college works for the protection of environment, especially in the adopted village every year.
- Environmental club has been established by the faculty of science departments to educate, conserve and to create awareness about environment.

Human Rights

- The college has Anti-ragging cell, Grievances Redressal cell and Counseling cell which are very active at the college campus.
- Lectures on legal awareness and human rights are organized by legal cells and human right organizations in our college campus.

ICT

- At the level B.Com I semester, syllabus of computer application course is introduced.
- Most of the faculties of our college have obtained computer knowledge.
- Our college has adequate ICT facilities such as Smart boards, Projectors, Computers and internet. Most of the faculties of our college make use of ICT during classroom teaching.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

1. Moral and ethical values

Special lectures on personality development organized from time to time. Celebration of birthdays of eminent personalities and the national festivals, many extension activities and other programmes of the college help to develop moral and ethical values among the students.

2. Employable and life skills

- Under the career guidance cell special lectures and workshops are organized on topics like communication skill, interview and group discussion.
- The cell organizes coaching classes for various competitive examinations like SDA, FDA, Police, Teacher recruitment and Bank recruitment.
- Workshops are organized by state industrial boards on self employment and small scale industries.

3. Better career options

- Career and counseling cell organizes campus interviews in collaboration with reputed firms.
- Special lectures and workshops are organized by inviting eminent persons on various job opportunities available.

4. Community orientation

- NSS, NCC and Red Ribbon Club strive hard to inculcate civic values among students.
- Regular NSS activities in the college campus and special NSS camp organized at adopted village helps to develop community orientation.
- NSS and NCC units participate in various community services like blood donation camp and AIDS awareness camp.

The college obtains feedback on curriculum from students, parents, alumni, employers and other stake holders while designing new courses. The faculties in turn make suggestions to the BOS of the University which are incorporated in the revision curriculum.

Based on the suggestions of these stake holders a **Certificate course** on **'Vermiculture'** and **Computer application** in B.Com. are introduced to meet challenging national and global needs.

TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

There has been a good practice to notify the details regarding admissions on the college notice board. The college is localized in the outskirt of the town enabling students to have an easy access. They simply walk in straight away to the college along with their parents/guardians to enquire about admission. They can see the notice board for admission process. Apart from this, a separate admission committee for each course comprising of respective teachers of the course will be constituted. The college has its own website. Wide publicity is being given to the admission process and it is updated every now and then. College prints prospectus which includes Hyderabad - Karnataka Education Society's Profile - A Brief note of the college and the courses offers. Combination of subjects, fees structure, staff, library, NCC and NSS in it.

The institution achieves and monitors to ensure transparency in the admission process. Students are given admission according to the norms of university and government. Thus, the admission processes of the college is transparent.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (e.x. (i) merit (ii) common Admission Test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (ii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit entrance test and interview (iv) any others to various programmes of the institution.

The wards who seek admission have to appear before the admission committee along with their parents/guardians. The age, marks scored in the previous examination, the place of the students are the information which need to be looked seriously. The students are selected on the basis of merit of previous qualifying examination. Entrance test is not conducted for the admission. The students will be asked questions about their background, interest to select a particular course their ambitions etc. This will help to assess the potentialities of new entrants.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of merits for admission at entrance level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city or district.

Ours is the most potential institution of higher education in taluka level. The enrollment of the students to various courses has been increasing year after year. It is evident from academic records. The minimum percentage of marks for admission at every level for each of programmes offered by the college is 35%. The maximum percentage of marks for admission to each programme varies. There is heavy rush of students for admission to all UG courses at entry level. The students with minimum 35% of marks and students with more than 80% of marks scored in previous qualifying examination will be given admissions to various programmes. The number of students seeking admission to this college is comparatively higher than other affiliating colleges of the university in this taluka.

The college has diversified students fraternity as compared to other colleges in the taluka. Average, below average and students with higher classes are also admitted. The students from diverse socio-economic background such as SC/ST, OBC, minority, below poverty line (BPL), above poverty line (APL) and affluent classes are admitted.

We follow the guidelines issued by the University i.e., Gulbarga University in admission process.

However, we have Committee for admission in the college to review the admission process and student profiles annually. The admission process is reviewed in the committee meeting as well as in the staff meeting and required changes in the process are made according to the opinions of the members.

The effort helped in streamlining and systematizing the admission process and bringing transparency. It helps in giving justice to students from rural, meritorious and disadvantaged sections of the society.

SC/ST

As the college is situated in rural area, providing opportunities to students from disadvantaged sections of the society is one the goals of the institution. Overall 25% of the total students constitutes of SC/ST. There is a provision of Government of Karnataka of scholarships for SC/ST students. We circulate the information regarding the scholarships and concessions to the students in the classroom as well as on the notice boards.

Women

It is a co-education college having more or less equal number of girl's students. Overall 42% of the total students constitutes of women. There is a provision in Government of Karnataka to grant scholarships for girl students also. A women's hostel is constructed in the college campus by the UGC fund for the benefit of needy girl students. The intention of government is to increase given enrollment ratio of women specially that are coming from rural areas. The institution meant to promote equity in the admission process for all categories. Now a days admissions are made available to all categories ensure justice to all. No cut off marks is given for any course.

Differently abled

To give due care to disabled students, a ramp and special toilet for physically challenged are constructed in the college. There is provision for special scholarship by the Government to them.

Economically weaker sections

Scholarships and freeships offered by Government of Karnataka are made available to them. They can also get hostel facility in local Government hostel.

Minority

There is provision of scholarship instituted by Government of Karnataka as well as Government of India. Hostel facility is also provided by the Government.

Every year strength of the college is increasing. Therefore, the intake has been raised frequently with the approval of the university. Quality education by qualified, competent and committed teaching staff, good infrastructure facility and affordable cost of education are responsible for the increase in the enrolment of students.

- Due care is taken at the time of preparing time table and classrooms are allotted to them at ground floor, keeping in view their convenience.
- Students with physical disability are also treated specially by the staff.
- To give due care to disabled students, a ramp and special toilet is constructed in the college.
- There is provision for special scholarship by the Government to them.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes give details on the process.

- Institution does not have any special provisions for assessing students knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. But the admission committee assesses the students during admissions on the basis of their performance in their previous examinations, sports, cultural activities and interaction with committee.
- The admission committee also refers students to concerned subject teachers for full advice as and when required.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice (Bridge/Remedial/Addon/Enrichment course, etc.).

Institution adopts different strategies to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope the programme of their choice.

- Through Orientation programme for the newly admitted students in the beginning of the academic year.
- Remedial coaching is given to the slow learners.
- Career and counseling cell tries to identify their weaknesses and suggests the steps to come out of their weaknesses.

- The cell also conducts special classes by experts on different topics related to communication, group discussion, interviews, competitive exams etc.
- Teachers engage extra classes during holidays to the students whenever required.
- Enrichment programmes such as seminars, workshops, special lectures with internal and external resource persons are conducted.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment, etc.

The college is more concerned about the issue of gender, inclusion and environment. The guidelines issued by the government, university and other agencies are strictly followed by staff and brought to the notice of the students.

- Special lectures are organized by eminent persons on issues like female feticide, women empowerment, gender discrimination etc.
- Ours is the co-education college girls strength is more to furnish knowledge about health and cleanliness. Various steps are introduced.
- Anti-ragging committee in the college works for Redressal of grievances of girl students.
- The university has recently made environment studies as compulsory paper to the students of all courses through which the students are sensitized effectively towards the issues concerning to environment.
- Environmental club is formed in the college which is engaged actively in sensitizing environmental issues by organizing special lectures, celebrating environmental day etc.
- The teacher during their classroom teaching, sensitize their students on these issues.

2.2.5 How does the institution identity and respond to special educational /learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners shall be identified on the basis of their performance in tests, seminars, assignments, group discussion and interaction with teachers. Such students are encouraged to participate in seminars, workshops conducted within and outside the college. Reference books of more advanced level are recommended to them by teachers. The teachers inspire them to appear both KPSC and UPSC competitive examinations. They are given coaching to appear competitive examinations and campus interviews through career and counseling cell. Further, they are encouraged to face the challenges posed by the present competitive world.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc.)?

The data and information on the academic performance of the students is collected based on the tests and home assignments held in classes.

Although we do not have separate provision they are motivated to increase their grasping ability, special classes are conducted for slow learners and disadvantaged community. They will be asked to have frequent interaction with teachers. By doing so, dropout rate may be brought to minimum.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process:

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organizes the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (Academic calendar, Teaching Plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

Planning and organizing of teaching-learning and evaluation is a continuous process in this institution.

Academic calendar is prepared in the beginning of the academic session by the academic committee of the institution in consultation with all the head of the departments. The academic calendar is displayed on the notice board and also issued to all the departments.

Work done diary and student attendance are maintained regularly and reviewed monthly.

Teaching plans are submitted by the teachers for each paper having unit wise distribution of the syllabi.

Internal assessment is made based on students' performance in class tests, assignments, seminar presentations and attendance. The final evaluation of students is done by the examinations conducted by the University. The results of the examinations are declared and score cards are issued by the University.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching process?

The vision of the institution is to increase the teaching and learning process on this background IQAC is established.

- It motivates the staff to organize seminars, workshops, conferences, guest lecturers by eminent persons from various fields.
- IQAC coordinates all the activities of the departments. It has been striving hard to improve the teaching and learning process.
- Introducing new teaching aids and ICT to improve the teachinglearning process and encourage innovative practices.

- Encouraging inter-disciplinary teaching learning activities, faculty development programmes and research activities.
- Steps for the improvement of results in the University examinations.
- Enhancing infrastructure facilities in terms of space, teaching and other equipments, libraries etc.
- Motivating the students to participate in extra-curricular, cultural and sports activities.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

The institution has put consistent efforts for making learning students centric. In the college, students have always been the centre of all its curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The committees for admissions, career guidance and counseling cell and remedial coaching classes are involved in grooming the students. NSS and NCC units are also responsible for the social development of students. The college organizes different programmes which would enable students to develop skills required for job market. Many a times interpersonal skills are taught to the students.

The support structures and systems available for teachers to develop the skills are audio-visual aids, OHP, LCD projectors, smart boards, computer, internet, library, laboratories, English language lab and reading rooms etc.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators.

- The teaching and learning process has been extended by institution beyond the class room. The teachers are trained to motivate students to become lifelong learners.
- To develop leadership qualities among the students by electing students union consisting of class representatives who in turn elect cultural secretary, sports secretary and vice president to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators.
- NSS, NCC and cultural activities instill in them qualities of co-operation, collective working, dignity of labor, respect to teachers and elders, discipline, nationalism and leadership.
- Students are encouraged to participate in different competitions such as debate, essay writing, elocution, rangoli competition, singing, drama and quiz contests.

- The college organizes seminars, workshops, conferences etc on various topics of different subjects.
- The college also arranges guest lectures on various social issues like corruption, women empowerment, dowry, women feticide, AIDS awareness, legal awareness, blood donation and eye camps etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from national programme on technology enhanced learning (NPTEL) and national mission on education through information and communication technology (NME-ICT) OPC educational resources, mobile education etc.

The institution has grown tremendously both in terms of quality and quantity. The college has following technologies and facilities for effective teaching.

- The teachers use new technology and other facilities like OHP and LCD for effective teaching.
- The computer lab has been set up with internet facility which can be used by the faculty for developing e-learning resources.
- The college has developed very good ICT facilities over the last five years such as OHPs, LCD projectors, Computer laboratories, Internet and Smart boards.
- Library has subscribed for some of the important e-journals and e-books.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)

- Teachers are deputed to participate in the orientation/refresher courses conducted by the Academic Staff Colleges and also in the seminars, workshops and conferences conducted by other institutions.
- Study tours and industrial visits are organized by the departments of Rural development, Kannada, History, Chemistry etc. to give practical approach to the students.
- The college library has been upgraded with more number of latest reference books, news papers, reputed journals and e-books.
- ICT in teaching learning process has been adopted in the college by establishing three computer laboratories with internet, smart boards, LCD projectors etc.
- The college has organized four UGC sponsored national level seminars on following topics

- 1. "Importance of communication skills and personality development in the modern world" by the department of English.
- 2. "Recent trends in Biodiversity of India" by the department of Zoology.
- 3. "Role of Chemistry in the nano world" by the department of Chemistry.
- 4. "Environmental crisis" by the department of Botany.

These have exposed the students and faculty to advanced level of knowledge.

- 2.3.7 Detail (Process and the number of students benefited) on the academic personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided students.
 - Academic service is provided by giving guidance to the students in the selection of proper subject/course at the time of admission. Remedial coaching is conducted for slow learners.
 - Personal and psycho-social support is provided by Career and counseling cell of the college. The cell gives proper guidance and counseling to the needy students.
 - Necessary guidance is provided to the students for participating in sports, cultural and co-curricular activities at college, zonal, University and Inter-university level.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - Apart from normal lecture method, the faculty follow the interactive method, group discussion, seminar, ICT, laboratory method etc.
 - During lecture method, teachers use graphs, tables, charts, figures etc.
 - Teachers are now teaching through ICT devices like Smart boards, LCD projectors, Computers and Internet.
 - Seminars and group discussions methods are used to evolve skills of data presentation, expression, interaction and comprehension of topics to students.
 - Screening of films based on plays and novels prescribed in the syllabus are arranged regularly.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process.

The college has a full-fledged and well stocked library. It has become resource and information centre to the students. Reference books, encyclopedias of different subjects, journals and magazines are subscribed by the college. Local and national news papers are also subscribed by the college to keep track of the latest developments in particular field. Copies of syllabi and question paper sets of all the subjects of the previous University examinations are made available to the students. Total books in library have increased to 28,000 since its inception. The grants are used to purchase enough books. New additions and titles of the books are purchased every year. Books are issued to the students at scheduled time. The library is opened for long hours from 10AM to 5PM. Journals and periodicals are also made available both for teachers and students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes.

We face many challenges to complete the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. Our college is affiliated to Gulbarga University. University prepares calendar of events. As the semester system is in force, sometimes given curriculum cannot be completed in given period of time because the teachers not only undertake curriculum activities in the college but also university examinations work like supervision and evaluation.

Apart from curricular activities the college encourages the students to participate in co-curricular, cultural and sports activities. However the syllabus is completed by engaging extra classes on Sundays and holidays. It is possible due to committed and devoted faculty.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Various steps are taken to monitor and evaluate quality of teaching and learning. Periodical staff meetings are held by head of the institution to assess the completion of monthly portion of curriculum. Every faculty maintains a work-done dairy and student's attendance. A self evaluation will be made by each faculty at the end of the year. The teachers also evaluate the performance of students in tests, seminars, group discussion and interaction. The IQAC also monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching and learning by collecting feedback from teachers, students, parents and alumni.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirement of the curriculum.

The recruitment of teaching faculty is done as per the rules and regulations of the University and Government of Karnataka. As it is a private aided institution, management gets permission to recruit staff and gets approved from Government of Karnataka. The applications from qualified candidates are invited by giving advertisement in leading newspapers. The selection committee consisting of members from the management and the government selects the qualified candidates through interview.

The IQAC encourages the teachers to use ICT facilities provided in the college for effective teaching. The college grants study leave and depute teachers for national and international seminars, conferences, workshops, training programmes etc. Special lectures are organized on various cross cutting issues like female feticide, gender equality, dowry, AIDS awareness, voting awareness etc.

Details regarding the evaluation process is given by the faculty of all the subjects while teaching in the classroom itself.

The model question papers and previous years question papers of University examinations are kept in the library for their reference.

The notifications and circulars issued by Gulbarga University regarding modification in the syllabi, pattern of examination, evaluation and time table are communicated to the students by concerned faculty in the classroom. The copy of the same is also displayed on the notice board.

The major evaluation reforms initiated by the University include

- The University has switched over to semester pattern for all the courses from earlier annual pattern.
- To check mal-practices in examinations the University deputes external examiners and flying squads on duty.
- Coding and decoding of answer scripts is practiced during the evaluation of the scripts to ensure fair evaluation.

- Centralized evaluation system is adopted by the University to avoid discrepancies in the evaluation process.
- The students can take photo copy of valued answer scripts. They may also apply for re totaling and revaluation.
- The results of all degree courses are made available on university website

The college also conducts periodic internal tests, seminars, assignments etc.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own.

- The implementation of evaluation reforms is being monitored by the principal, HODs and IQAC.
- The University circulars, notifications and examination time-table are informed by the faculty in the classrooms. The copies of the same are also displayed on notice boards.
- The college permits the staff to participate in evaluation works like paper setting, examination duties, central evaluation of scripts etc.
- The students who not satisfied with their results are advised to apply through the college for getting the photocopy of answer scripts and reevaluation

The students are important stake holder and a direct beneficiary in the process of education. The student is evaluated by teacher internally at the institution level and externally by university. The main concern of the institution is the holistic development of the students. Classroom seminars and assignments are conducted by the faculty to develop innovation and research aptitude amongst the students. Industrial visits and study tours are organized to develop awareness about quality jobs and entrepreneurship.

The college will maintain records of all the students. The faculties identify the barriers of learning and report them during the staff meeting. In the meeting necessary planning is made to solve the barriers of learning.

Some of the recommendations made by the Research Committee for implementation are stated below:

- 1) The researches undertaken should be genuine and original in all the aspects.
- 2) Plagiarism should be strictly prohibited.
- 3) Sources and references of the books and authors should be duly quoted, cited and acknowledged.
- 4) An abstract of the proposed Research should be submitted before the Committee for further proceedings.
- 5) All the amenities utilized for the research work should be used carefully and sensibly.
- 6) The research Committee facilitates support and monitors the research activities.

The meeting of research committee is conducted at regular intervals. The committee discusses the proposals put forth by different faculty members and finalizes their claims. The college has been included u/s 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC Act. The college has received grants from UGC under XI plan for capacity building, purchase of teaching aids, library books, construction of women hostel, ladies toilets etc. The committee has taken decisions for utilizing UGC grants. Apart from that the committee decisions in respect of promoting research in the college. This committee meets often to have discussions over various issues relating to UGC and research activities. The committee is encouraging teachers to take up research under FDP. Those teachers who wish to do research will be deputed as per the guidelines of UGC. The faculty members are motivated and encouraged to submit their research proposals to UGC for the award of Minor and Major Research projects and for conducting National seminars, workshops, symposium, etc.

Impact of the suggestions:

- Three of our faculty members are doing their Ph.D. on part-time basis.
- Totally three minor research projects worth Rs. 5,05,000/- are sanctioned by UGC.
- During the last four years our faculties have attended 98 national and 2 international seminars. One faculty i.e., Dr. Rajshekhar Babnoor, Department of Botany, has presented a paper in international seminar.
- During last four years totally four national seminars have been organized in the college by different departments.
- One of the faculties has published his paper in international journal and 7 papers are published in national journals.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

Our principal is the core source of encouragement and stimulates the staff to pursue Ph.D. researches. The faculty members are encouraged to apply for research projects sponsored by National agencies. The teacher pursuing research activities are allowed to avail facilities like Academic Leave to attend and present their research papers in various conferences. They are allowed to use library, laboratory and internet facilities. The laboratories are well equipped with all necessary equipments. The college library is enriched with national journals, books, magazines, etc to facilitate research projects. Internet facility is available in various department of the college campus.

- The College promotes research activities and encourages the teachers to attend Research Oriented Workshops and seminars.
- Teachers are constantly motivated to undertake Major and Minor Research Projects.
- The Principal facilitates all the formalities concerned with the submission of the Major or Minor Research proposals and extends all the possible support in the best manner.

- The College facilitates the research oriented and research engaged teachers in every possible way to proceed with their research work.
- The College actively promotes research oriented activities by extending all types of assistance admissible under the service rules.
- Teachers who have completed Minor or Major Research work as well as teachers who have been awarded with Doctoral Degree are appreciated and felicitated in Public both by the institution and by the Management.
- Moreover research publications, edited works, participation and paper presentations in the National and International Seminars are highly appreciated and felicitated.
- The researcher or the Principal investigator enjoys the autonomy in his research work
- The Institution facilities the timely availability of sources and resources needed in the research work.
- Adequate infrastructure is also made available for the teachers like reference books, laptops, use of library even after college hours if needed etc.
- Special Leaves and Duty leave are also granted for the teachers for pursuing research works.
- The head of the institution and the institution facilitates timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities.
- The head of the institution makes extra efforts to make follow ups and contacts the funding authorities in case of any necessity.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution has geared up efforts to create research nature among students and the institution has apprehended the necessity for research in view of the changes taking place in higher education. The needs of national and international job market in particular and the society in general are undergoing changes drastically. In order to cater to the changing needs of society and job market, research activities have been included in the curricula.

The following efforts are made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among the students:

- 1) Right from the undergraduate level the institution gives an exposure of seminars, workshops, conferences to the students admitted in this institution.
- 2) The Students are also encouraged to make class-room presentation on any of the topics of their subjects and their choice which indirectly lead them towards research area. The institution is promoting participation of students in research activities such as project work and socio Economic survey etc.
- 3) The extension activities are conducted through NSS in which students are actively involved. Students can develop research aptitude and scientific temper.

4) In addition to this, the students of our college are also encouraged to participate in state level seminars, conferences along with their teachers in their respective subjects and are motivated even to present research papers individually or collectively.

There is provision for granting study leave for those teachers who want to carry on research activities. The institution grants study leave to teachers as per the rules and regulations of UGC under FDP after obtaining permission from the Department of collegiate education. The leave will be granted subject to the condition. Granting of study leave will increase research quality and culture of the college. Most of the faculty members are undertaking research activities without obtaining study leave. They do it on a part time basis. Some teachers are planning to avail study leave to carry on research activities on full time basis. The provision envisaged in UGC regulations is helpful in promoting research culture of the college.

The institution makes significant contribution to community by advocating the relative findings of the research. It ensures that the benefits of research will be made available to deserving people in the community. The aim of the institution is to see that the fruit of higher education and research should reach common people. There are two NSS units in the college which organize extension and outreach programmes through which students can have easy access to the community. Students will be engaged in socio-economic survey, market survey, ecological and environment survey and the findings of these surveys will be ultimately transferred to the community at large. Teachers and students are responsive to the changing needs of society.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college is so far not recognized as a research centre. It is a leading institution of higher education offering only UG courses. Financial allocation for research does not arise. There are no major heads of expenditure to be incurred for research activities. The faculty can undertake major and minor projects being funded by UGC directly. Financial allocations will be made by UGC individually based on the importance and size of the projects. Until now the research grant worth Rs. 5.05 lakhs has been sanctioned by UGC to three staff members of the college.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty who has availed the facility in the last four vears?

There is no provision in the institution to provide seed money to faculty for research. No faculty has availed this facility. UGC is the funding agency for research activities. The faculty will be allowed to take up major and minor projects either on part time basis or full time basis for which the grants would be released by UGC. The faculty can avail facilities as per the guidelines of Government.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

There are no specific financial provisions made available for supporting student's research projects. Since the college is not a research institution, such provisions are not available to students. However there are certain other facilities made available in the institution to develop research culture in the students such as computer lab with internet facility, reference books and audio-visual resources in library.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The college is not yet recognized as research centre. So, the units/staff of the college do not interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research. No such activities were taken up till now. But the college is promoting research culture and outlook among the staff and students. Now the college has 21 teaching faculty of whom 05 are Ph.D. holders. Teachers who have doctoral degree often share their knowledge and experiences with those who are doing research and guide them in their endeavor.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The college receives grants from the UGC every year for purchasing equipments, tools, materials, computers and library books etc,. Grants have also been given by UGC under XI plan for capacity building and purchasing the above items. So, the institution has sufficient equipments and tools and created adequate facilities for the use of teachers and students.

The institution is ensuring the optimum use of these facilities both by the staff and students. There is more number of books in the college library. The staff and students will be persuaded to go to library frequently for using library resources.

Computer lab has been set up with internet facilities. The staff and students have been permitted to use computer and internet technology relating to their subjects at stipulated time.

Students of science can avail facilities available in laboratory to the maximum extent. For ensuring the optimum use of each resource a separate time table has been drawn up. This would not only ensure the optimum use of resources and also make sure that there will be utmost discipline while using these resources.

After completion minor/major research projects sanctioned by UGC, the books as well as equipments purchased under UGC grant are returned to the college which can used by the other researchers and students.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute industry interface?

The institution is in transition period and therefore a full-fledged institute - industry interface is yet to be established.

- The policy of the institution is to establish long term relationship with industry for mutual benefits of students, staff, Industry and other stakeholders. A system is evolved and workable strategies are framed by the institution with useful inputs given by internal stakeholders to establish institute-industry interface. Industrial visit is a part of academic study. Students of the college are allowed to go on industrial visit with their teachers every year and learn new knowledge and enrich their experiences.
- Institution industry interface is much useful to students to acquire new practical knowledge and develop new attitude. Besides it improves the consultancy services rendered by the staff and it paves the way for placement of students at the end of their graduation.
- The lectures organized by Banking and Corporate sector to interact with the students helps in bridging the gap between institution and industry.
- NSS and NCC volunteers as well as faculty members participate in the activities arranged by the organizations like Blood bank, Red Cross society, AIDS prevention society etc.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The institution is aimed at promoting consultancy by creating and providing required facilities to the faculty. The facilities are on increase these days with increase in the strength of faculty. Teachers have scholarly attitude and are humane in nature. The services of experienced teachers can be utilized not only in class rooms but also extended to the community. Some teachers are always willing to extend their services and are motivated with all the facilities they need.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

There is limited scope for consultancy service in the college. However, Teachers are encouraged to utilize their expertise and facilities available in the college for consultancy services. Teachers are allowed to work for long hours in the college and accommodated fully so that they can engage in giving consultancy services.

The areas in which the consultancy services are provided by the institution/staff and its advantages are given below.

- The language departments such as Kannada, English and Hindi are actively involved in linguistic work. These services are provided to the people who are in necessitating of it. Language teachers have been invited as resource persons to seminars conducted by local institutions.
- Teachers in sociology/Rural Development department offer counseling services to deserving students and community people. Teachers visited villages where special camps were held by NSS units of the college and advised people against child marriage, subjugation and harassment of women, ill-effects of alcohol consumption and drug addiction etc.
- The department of commerce in the college has been providing valuable consultancy services in Income tax, Accounting, Auditing, administration and the like. Consultancy services in income tax have been provided to all teachers of the college, teachers of other institutions, employees of Government department, local businessmen and entrepreneurs, organizations and industry. The department guides in calculating tax liability preparation of form No. 16 and submission of income tax returns. Ex-students of the college who are self employed have also availed consultancy services.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

No income was generated through consultancy service so far, because the consultancy provided by the college/faculty is courtesy services.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhoodcommunity network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The vision of the institution has been the holistic development of students. The students are prepared to face the challenges in their lives rather than making them mere graduates. The college strives for allround development of student's personality. The students are given ample opportunities for their personality development.

- The various programmes such as personality development, career development and a host of other events are being organized by the college which lead to all-round development of student's personality.
- The institution is promoting in extension activities like NSS, NCC, Sports and other cultural activities. Students have been taught the value of service to the society.
- Through the activities of the NSS and NCC units, the alumni and association, college promotes institution-neighborhoodcommunity network by engaging students. These activities aim at developing good citizenship among the students.
- NSS camp of one week is organized every year in a adopted village during which the NSS volunteers involve in social works like cleaning roads, leveling of school playground, digging pits for new plantation. Creating awareness about health and hygiene, superstition, scientific temper etc. These activities aim at giving service orientation to the students.
- NSS volunteers also participate in creating awareness about voting among the common people during elections.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The community network has been developed through NSS for involving students in social activities. The college plans and conducts various social activities in and outside the college campus in which the students can be actively involved. The students are encouraged and motivated to take part in social movements that are held in this area. The students involve in social activities voluntarily as they belong to first generation learners. More than 75% of students are coming from rural area and having access to the community. The students are made to feel that they are responsible to the society by being good citizens. A sense of social responsibility has been created among students. The staff of the

college makes students to feel that they should play citizenship roles. Human values, social values and social etiquettes are inculcated to students while teaching curricula. The institution promotes the participation of students in social activities and which will also promote citizenship roles.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The institution solicits perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution by having meeting and taking feedback from students, alumni and parents. The class representative acts as a liaison between the class teacher counselors. The perceptions of the student community are captured and relevant remedial measures are ensured at the earliest. Further, the students have the freedom to approach the Principal during working hours. Feedback is also taken from the visitors to assess the performance and quality of the institution, to the extent possible based on their expertise.

- These activities develop scientific and rational attitude among the students.

- The prospectus of the college provides information regarding NSS, NCC and other activities available in the college to facilitate the students to choose the activities of their interest.

- NSS and NCC officers and Cultural secretaries motivate the students by briefing them with the significance of the activities.
- Extension activities will be organized by NSS units in collaboration with local associations in which the students and faculty will be encouraged to participate.

Sincere activities have been made by the institution to integrate social survey, research and extension activities in curriculum. All these activities have been undertaken by NSS unit of the college. The NSS unit organize regular every week and special camp for seven days in selected village. The NSS students are involved in conducting socio-economic surveys and research in the village where the special camp is organized. Along with socio-economic survey the various extension activities are conducted by NSS students at the camp site. Some of the extension activities undertaken by NSS students in the village were blood donation camp, Medical camp, legal awareness programme, Health and hygienic etc,. By this way the institution ensures social justice, equity and empowers under-privileged and vulnerable sections of the society.

The primary objective of the college has been the holistic development of students, to make responsible citizens of the country and to serve the society by creating positive changes.

During the camps and other social activities the social values of national integrity, gender equality, eradication of caste discrimination are inculcated. Also skills like spoken English, group discussion and reasoning are sharpened in the activities. Organizing extension activities along with outreach programmes continuously through NSS and local agencies provide long lasting benefits to students on the one hand and render services to the community.

The institution is easily accessible to the community since it is located near to the town. It has been rendering invaluable services to the society and contributing a lot to the development of community ever since it came into being in 1980. Social service and community development are envisaged in the vision statement of the institution. Community development is ensured either directly or indirectly through its meaningful activities. So far it has produced graduates who could become the productive members of community and make a great contribution to their own community. Sincere efforts have been made by the institution to involve the community in its activities. Many initiatives have been taken by the institution in organizing community development programmes. The community is encouraged and motivated to involve actively in all such activities. There is one NSS unit with 100 volunteers organizes community development programmes every year. Special and weekly camps are held in the backward and slum areas. All these programmes enable students to get access to the community. The NSS volunteers will be motivated to mix up with community and to understand the aspirations and ambitions of common people. The volunteers stayed in villages for about a week and undertaken the constructive programmes leading to the community development. The programmes organized by NSS units were free medical checkup, health and hygienic, aids awareness etc. The principal and staff of the college supported whole heartedly. Many outreach activities were also organized by the college in association with GO and NGO's in which the community participated actively. The University is also extending support in conducting outreach activities for the benefit of community. In addition to this health and hygiene awareness programme, dental and medical camps, free eye test camp, blood donation camp, adult education and literacy awareness programme, aids awareness programme, female infanticides awareness programme and environmental awareness programme are being conducted through NSS and NCC units of the college. The college organized three eye camps at slum area of Aland town in association with H.K.E.S's, Basavashwar Hospital, Gulbarga and also NSS unit organized special lecture on solar energy in joint association with Syndicate Bank, Aland.

Over the years the college has successfully organized outreach and extension activities through NSS, Cultural Forum, Sports department, Forums of different units of the college in association with GO's and NGO's. Some of the activities were sponsored by Government departments and also by NGO,s in which the students participated enthusiastically.

- Blood donation camps were held in the college by NSS units in association with Red Cross society. Both the students and staff donated blood voluntarily. This type of camp is held almost every year.
- A programme called Legal aid to the students and community was conducted by inviting judges as resource persons.
- An innovative programme such as Go-Green and Aforestation were organised in co-ordination with Forest department.
- Awareness was created among people about health and hygiene, AIDS, dengue fever, malaria and infectious diseases by organizing programmes in association with health department.
- The services of students were utilized in immunization programme conducted by health department. Social and environment awareness programmes are conducted by the college by involving concerned GO's and NGO's.
- Saplings supplied by Forest department were planted in and around college premises and villages where special camps were conducted by NSS units.
- A women cell was inaugurated in the college by women judges with an object of providing legal aid and prevention of harassment to women.
- Students were taken on rallies, jathas holding placards creating an awareness among people about the social evils plaguing the society such as female infanticide, feticide etc.

The management has given a top priority to provide adequate physical facilities since education has been identified as one of the priority sectors. In order to provide quality higher education to the students coming from different areas the institution carries on innumerable co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. - First-Aid kit is available in the college premises to provide emergency health care to the students.
- The college is in constant touch with local Doctors both from Government health center and private clinics. They are frequently invited to the college on a number of occasions like blood donation camps, Medical check-up and AIDS awareness programmes etc.

Safe drinking water facility:

Aqua guard RO water purifier is installed in the staff room to provide safe and pure water to all the staff. Water filter cum cooler is installed to provide cool and pure water to the students.

Auditorium:

A big hall with a platform and seating arrangements for large number of audience is available for different activities in the college.

Spacious staff room with individual lockers and attached toilet room is available to the staff.

A night watchman is engaged to take care of the campus.


6.2.2 Does the institution have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The organizational structure of the college is as follows



Governing Body:

The college is run by Hyderabad Karnataka Education Society (HKES), Gulbarga. At the apex there is Governing Body consisting President, Vice-President, Secretary and Council members. Broad policy decisions are made in the meetings of the governing body.

The Principal:

The principal is the academic and administrative head of the institution. He functions as liaison between governing body and faculty, administrative staff, students and parents. He is also the connecting link between the college and external agencies like University, Government and UGC.

IQAC:

IQAC consists of senior members of the faculty and administrative staff, students, alumni, management representatives and experts from varied fields outside the college. The cell develops plans for quality enhancement of the college.

Teaching Staff:

It consists of the HODs and other faculty of the department. Regular meetings of the HODs are conducted to discuss the academic calendar, teaching plan, distribution of work etc.

Office Staff:

It consists of Office Superintendant, FDA, SDA, Attendars and Peons. The principal holds regular meetings with the office staff to discuss the routine work and problems faced by them.

Librarian:

He is in-charge of library of the college. A junior clerk and two attendars assist librarian. The principal along librarian and all the HODs discuss the allocation of library budget to different departments, purchase of books, periodicals, newspapers and journals.

Students Council:

Students council is formed on the basis of merit at the University examinations. The students council consists Vice president, Secretary and Class representatives. They are encouraged to participate in academic and extra-curricular activities of the college.

Teaching & learning

The college motivates the faculty for maximum use of ICT based teaching. The college has installed Smart Boards, LCDs and Computers with internet connection.

Special lectures are also organized to impart knowledge on various burning topics.

Research & Development

The college has 21 teaching faculty of whom 05 are Ph.D. holders. Teachers who have doctoral degree often share their knowledge and experiences with those who are doing research and guide them in their endeavor.

There is provision for granting study leave for those teachers who want to carry on research activities. The committee is encouraging teachers to take up research under FDP. Those teachers who wish to do research will be deputed as per the guidelines of UGC.

The faculty members are motivated and encouraged to submit their research proposals to UGC for the award of Minor and Major Research

Faculty are also encouraged to conduct National seminars, workshops, symposium, etc.

Community engagement

NSS and NCC establish linkages between college and community through its various activities organized throughout the year.

NSS through its special camp in the adopted village establish linkages between college and the community.

Human resource management

The success of the institution depends on the management of the human resource viz. teaching and office staff. The college makes every effort to recognize the potential of the faculty.

Industry interaction

Industrial visit is a part of academic study. Students of the college are allowed to go on industrial visit with their teachers every year and learn new knowledge and enrich their experiences.

Institution industry interface is much useful to students to acquire new practical knowledge and develop new attitude. Besides it improves the consultancy services rendered by the staff and it paves the way for placement of students at the end of their graduation.

The lectures organized by Banking and Corporate sector to interact with the students helps in bridging the gap between institution and industry.

Energy conservation

- The architectural design of our college is made, keeping in view maximum use of natural light and ventilation.
- Efforts are made to reduce the energy consumption by the minimum use of electric light and fans during day time. This is possible because of wide windows and ventilators of classrooms.
- The plantation inside the campus consisting of large number of green trees, shrubs and bushes make the environment carbon dioxide free and provides shade and gives beautiful ambience.

Efforts for Carbon neutrality

- Heavy vehicles are prohibited in the campus. The college has made provision for the parking of vehicles of staff and students outside the campus to keep the campus pollution free.
- The dead leaves and the waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire in the college campus.
- Smoking is prohibited in the college campus.

Plantation

- The college is situated on the outskirts of the town and spangled on 17 acres of vast area. Hundreds of trees have been planted and were maintained. Today except the play ground total area of the college is covered with green shadow. As many as six big lawns, botanical garden, one pond and one fish pond are also enhancing the beauty of the green campus.
- NCC and NSS units organize tree plantation programmes in the vicinity of the college.

Hazardous waste management

• The waste from the chemical laboratory and the sanitary waste from bathrooms and toilets is disposed in separate septic tanks constructed for the purpose.

E-waste management

- Maximum effort is made to re-use the electronic devices by repair, reorganization etc.
- E-waste like chips, bulbs, mother boards, computers, batteries are segregated and scrapped.

7.2 Innovations

- ICT in Teaching The faculty members are making more use of computers, internet, power point projectors and smart boards in their teaching.

- Counseling and career guidance cell has been established in the year 2010-11. A number of career oriented programmes are conducted every year by inviting resource persons from different organizations.

- Network resource center is established by the financial assistance from UGC. It has 6 computers with high speed broad band internet for the enrichment of student knowledge base.
- Commerce lab has been established with the financial assistance from UGC which has six computers with internet connectivity.
- English Language Lab has been established with six computers and the necessary software.

- Constructions of big classrooms Four new big classrooms are constructed by demolishing the old ones.
- Gymnasium is established in the sports room.
- Special toilet is constructed for physical challenged students.

- IQAC room has one Computer, one Printer with copy and scan facility and one LCD Projector.
- The computer is connected with high speed broad band internet.
- The IQAC room also has inverter for power backup.

6. Library

- Library has one Computer and one Printer with database software installed.
- The computer is also connected with broad band internet.

7. Various Departments

- Department of Chemistry is provided with one Computer and one Printer with Copy and Scan facility. Broad band internet connection is also provided.
- Department of Physics has one Computer with internet connection.

E. Post Accreditation Initiatives

This college render its deepest gratitude to the honorable members of peer team for having made the valuable recommendations in order to facilitate the process of imparting quality education to the students and to attain the set of goals and objectives of this college. After accreditation with 'B' grade by NAAC in 17th October, 2006 this college constituted IQAC on 11.01.2007 to enhance existing academic and non-academic quality of the college by observing the recommendations made NAAC peer team.

The following are the quality enhancement initiatives taken by the institution as suggested by the IQAC as per the recommendations of the NAAC peer team.

- 1. The college may introduce new combinations in the existing programme and may also start certificate/diploma courses in the areas of rural development, banking services, computer education, social work, horticulture, floriculture, music, public speaking, nutrition, yoga and adult education.
 - The college has introduced career oriented course in 'vermiculture' sanctioned under the UGC XI plan. This course will be run along with the regular degree courses i.e. B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com.
 - Introduced history subject for B.A. programme as one the optional subjects.
 - Computer application subject is introduced in the syllabus for first year of commerce programme.
 - Apart from this we are teaching 'Constitution of India' and 'Environmental Studies' to all the UG students as it is made compulsory by Gulbarga University.
- 2. The college may also introduce courses in environmental science, journalism and rural entrepreneurship and post graduate programmes in Kannada and Bio-chemistry.
 - The affiliating University i.e. Gulbarga University has introduced 'Environmental Science' as compulsory additional subject to the students and it is being taught to the students.
 - Starting post graduate programmes in Kannada and Bio-chemistry is not feasible in this college as Central University of Karnataka, Gulbarga University, Gulbarga and Marathwada University PG Center, Umarga (Maharashtra) are in 30 kms radius.
- 3. The teachers may be encouraged to improve their qualifications and avail facilities of FIP and QIP.
 - This college always encourages the teachers for their qualification improvement. As many as 07 teachers completed Ph.D., 06 teachers completed M.Phil., and 01 teachers has qualified in SLET. At present 02 teachers are perusing their Ph.D.

• The college supports all the faculty to attend OC, RC and national/international seminars to upgrade their existing knowledge.

4. The classes for various programmes may be brought into a single time frame, existing shift system may be abolished.

• With the help of faculty of the college and as per the UGC norms we have framed and implemented uniform time table so as to run the classes for various programmes under a single shift system.

5. The college may organize national and state level seminar/conferences and teachers may be encouraged to actively participate in such activities.

- With the support of faculty, we have successfully organized 04 national level seminars and 01 state level workshop in our college.
- Apart from this most of the faculty have attended and presented papers in various national, international and state level seminars and conferences

6. A good seminar hall and well furnished auditorium may be provided.

• A well furnished spacious auditorium is constructed under UGC grants and Management grants. The auditorium is also equipped with Smart board, LCD Projector, Audio System etc.

7. Utility of the land for cultivation of medicinal and aromatic plants may be explored from the point of view of generating resources for the college.

After cultivating the lands for years with traditional crops, now the land has become level and fertile. Due to scarcity of water resources and scanty rains we could not brought the land under medicinal and aromatic plants. But recently we developed a small Botanical garden.

8. Earn while you learn programmes for students may be introduced.

- As this is a rural college most of the students hail from small villages, that too from agriculture labor family. They wish to earn while learn with their parents during holidays.
- Secondly, we are giving computer knowledge so as to enable them to do computer job works in their leisure or vacation time.

9. The facilities for good canteen and gymnasium may be provided.

- We have provided canteen for both students and staff.
- Under the UGC and Management share we have established a spacious and well placed gymnasium for students. It is well equipped with latest gymnastic equipments. Student make use of it in the morning in between 6 to 8 am and 5 to 7 pm in the evening.

10. Hostel facilities and guest rooms may be made available on the campus.

- We have constructed Women's Hostel in this college campus under UGC grants. Enrolment is yet to be started.
- We have submitted a proposal for guest house, both to UGC and Management.

11. Women's cell may be organized. A lady staff member be asked to do counseling for women.

We have established Women's cell with one ladies staff from teaching and one from non teaching staff. Ladies representative of students union is also one of the members of the cell. They do counseling for the women. Since the establishment of the cell not a single case of women harassment, exploitation and ragging is reported.

12. The linkage with industry and business establishment may be established.

There is no industry in this area. Recently NSL Sugar Factory has started its production. They have co-sponsored one of our national level seminar. State Bank of Hyderabad also co-sponsored seminar organized by English department. A workshop was organized jointly by the department of Rural Development and Syndicate Bank.

13. The health center may be strengthened and regular visits of consultants including a lady doctor be arranged.

Our HKE Society has Medical, Dental and Homeopathic College and Hospital. Doctors often visit our college for health awareness camps and for regular health checkups. We have a health center constructed under UGC grants.

14. The placement cell and the cell for students welfare and grievances may be strengthened.

• Career and Guidance cell is established in this college. The UGC has released grants for it. Expert resource persons are invited to guide the students for different competitive exams and placements. Prof. S. S. Katti, Associate Professor in Commerce is actively working as its coordinator. ACC cement factory, HDFC Bank authorities have organized campus interviews. As many as 06 students of this college have got selected.

15. The active participation of the alumni members and parents in the development of the college may be ensured.

- As this college is imparting quality education to the desired students of this area since last 32 years, the alumni members number is very good. They have constituted a alumni association. Maximum alumni visit the college regularly and share new idea and inspire the students.
- We always maintain cordial and regular contact with the parents. Parents meet is held once in a year to interact them.

• We have organized special lectures by subject experts on different subjects. We have organized Spoken English classes, Yoga classes under UGC's Remedial coaching scheme and Career guidance cell.

SECTION-I INTRODUCTION

The A.V.Patil Degree College of Arts, Science and Commerce at Aland was established by the Hyderabad Karnataka Education Society in June, 1980 with an objective of catering higher education to the students of rural and backward regions of North Karnataka. It is a grant-in-aid College affiliated to Gulbarga University and located in an area of 26 acres adjacent to Aland town. The College is recognized under 2(f) and 12 B of UGC Act in 1982 and 1990 respectively.

The vision of the College is to propagate the cause of quality education in Arts, Science and Commerce to the students of rural and backward areas and make it available to them at an affordable cost. The College is offering B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com. programmes and a certificate course in Spoken English. The total strength of the students in all courses put together in the year 2005-2006 was 595. There are 27 permanent and 6 part time teaching members of whom 5 are PhDs and other 5 hold M.Phil. The total number of non-teaching faculty is 10. The College building is two-storeyed structure of good quality and it houses the Principal's room, Office, 15 class rooms, a girls' common room, a seminar room, a staff room and facilities for NCC, NSS, sports and games and a small canteen. The College maintains 5 lawns, a botanical garden and play grounds for Ball-Badminton, Volley-Ball and Kho-Kho.

The Library has a total collection of 15,118 books, and 9 journals and periodicals are regularly subscribed. The unit cost of education with salary component is Rs.14,500 and without salary component, Rs. 974.

The College was accreditated by NAAC in 2004 with C++ grade. It has again submitted the proposal to National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) for its assessment and accreditation in 2006. The NAAC constituted the Peer Team with Prof. Chandrakant Kokate, Former Vice-Chancellor, Kakatiya University, Warangal, A.P., as the Chairman and Prof. Sankaran Ravindran, Professor of English, University of Calicut, Malappuram, Kerala, as its Member. Dr.(Mrs.) Sujata Shanbhag, Assistant Advisor, NAAC, was the Coordinator for the visit of the Peer Team on the 7th, 8th and 9th August, 2006. The Peer Team visited all the infrastructural facilities of the College for teaching-learning, co-curricular, extra-curricular and other extension activities, and the library and perused all relevant documentary evidences and records. The Peer Team interacted with the Principal, the members of the Governing Council, the students and the representatives of alumni and parents. Based on the in-depth exercise of assessment undertaken by the Peer Team, the following criterion-wise observations are made.

SECTION - II CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

CRITERION – I : CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The goals and objective of the College, which are in conformity with those of HKE Society's major objectives, are (1) to impart higher education to all the sectors of the society (2) to strengthen the spirit of competition among the students (3) to facilitate women education and (4) to make students to be hard-working and disciplined. To carry forward the torch of higher education and research, which is the mission of the College, especially in a location in a remote place near the border with Maharashtra, often designated most backward area, the College has taken education to the doors of the villagers.

The College offers three under-graduate programmes: B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. The B.A programme has four streams, the B.Sc. programme has three streams, and the B.Com programme has one stream with different options in the third year. As the

academic programme and the streams are designed and made available by Gulbarga University, the College, like other affiliated colleges, has freedom only to pick and choose the programmes. But, while working within these limitations, the College has designed its time-frame matching student convenience and has offered a good number of areas of studies. But, on its own, as there is freedom to offer Certificate Courses and Diploma Courses, the College has offered two Certificate Courses, one in Spoken English and the other in Computer Education. In the past, the College conducted job-oriented Courses in Agricultural Economics & Farm Management, Laboratory Technician, and Pre-school Education.

Seven members of the faculty of the College are members of the Boards of Studies in different disciplines: Economics, Physics, Sociology, Urdu, Marathi, Education and Sugar Technology; and, therefore, the College has been able to contribute to the serious academic deliberations of the University over the curricular aspects. Three members of the faculty are chairmen of Boards of Examinations. As the University carries out an yearly inspection in the College through an Inspection Committee, a sort of academic audit has been taking place every year. Besides, the assessment of the teachers done by the students also strengthens the feedback mechanism.

The total number of working days of the College during 2005-2006 was 293, while the actual number of teaching days was 189.

CRITERION - II : TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Advertisements in news papers is the means to announce the courses offered by the College. Applications received from the students are processed for admission on the basis of the marks obtained in the qualifying examination, and, of course, taking into account the rules of admission framed by Gulbarga University as well as by the Government of Karnataka. The ability of the students to handle the areas of studies they have taken up is assessed through tests and examinations. With respect to the final year and the second year students, the old system of year-end examination continues to exist,

and in this system the College, like other affiliated colleges, prepares the students for the final examination conducted by the University. Nevertheless, from this year onwards, as the University has introduced semester system, 20% marks will have to be awarded by the Departments and hence the teaching-learning process is bound to be more intense and serious in terms of the significance of the tests and examinations.

Teachers are selected and appointed on the basis of the work load in the subjects of study. Selections are based on UGC guidelines as well as the University rules. However, as there is the need to get a green signal from the Government to advertise a teaching post and to conduct the selection, the College has been finding it difficult to fill in the grant-in-aid posts due to the Governmental policy of not giving permission to fill in the posts. To overcome this difficulty, the College Management has been appointing lecturers on part-time basis, a process which adversely affects the quality of teaching and learning.

The syllabi is unitized and the unitization is approved by the Heads of the Departments (in cases where there is more than one faculty member handling a subject) and also by the Principal. Due to this kind of unitization, the syllabi is contained in the time-frame. The teachers use OHP, charts, models, and other relevant tools to increase the effect of teaching.

The percentage of pass in 2004-2005 has been: B.Sc. 100, B.A. 94, and B.Com. 95 and in 2005-2006: B.Sc. 95, B.A. 89, and B.Com 61.

CRITERION - III : RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Although research is directly not a component of the teaching programme in the College, as a component enhancing the quality of teaching, the value of research degrees and also the usefulness of research oriented exercises like seminars are felt by the faculty. There are 5 teachers with the Ph.D. degree and 5 teachers with M.Phil

degree, and a few of the teachers have registered for M.Phil. Four faculty members are approved Research Guides for Gulbarga University.

Although the College has not organized any National seminar or International Seminars in the last 5 years, class-rooms seminars are organized occasionally for the benefit of the students. A few of the teachers have attended national and international seminars held in India and most of them have completed the required number of Refresher Courses.

One teacher in the Department of Kannada is a writer and has authored 6 books and edited 9 for University level teaching. He is also the recipient of State level awards and is a member of the Karnataka Sahithya Academy. Similarly, the academic performance of a teacher in Hindi, in terms of his publication, in noteworthy.

The Department of Sugar Technology has been rendering consultancy services to a near by industry. However, so far no revenue has been earned for the College because the consultancy services rendered were free of charge.

The extension activities of the College have been carried out chiefly through NSS and NCC. NSS has two units with two officers. Blood donation, AIDS awareness, community work, and conducting eye and dental camps have been the major kinds of work carried out by the NSS. The NCC army wing has 80 cadets (53 men and 27 women). An officer of the rank of lieutenant is in charge of the unit. As there are women cadets, the need of a lady officer is felt by the girl students.

CRITERION - IV :INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College is situated in the outskirts of the town, in an area of 26 acres. It has a well maintained building which is adequate to run the existing programmes. The Principal's room, Office, a seminar hall, a girls' rest room, computer center and a health center are housed on the first floor. The central library, staff room, class rooms, NCC

room and laboratories are on the ground floor. The basement houses NSS and sports and games rooms. The College has a canteen, which is inadequate in terms of its structure and size. Construction of an auditorium with 300 in capacity, and of sports and health-care rooms, with the UGC assistance of Rs 11.44 lakhs, is under progress.

All the laboratories, namely Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Sugar Technology, are well maintained and fairly equipped. Library has a total of 15,118 books, 9 journals and magazines. The Library is partly computerized, and has a reading room with capacity to accommodate 50 students at a time. It has Book Bank facility for SC/ST students. A few books have been donated by Jindal and Infosys to this Library. Open access system is to be provided, in stead of the present method of giving books on request to students, if the Library is to be effectively utilized.

The College has sports facilities both for indoor and out door games. It has Kho-Kho, Volley-Ball and Ball-Badminton courts. The College has enough land to develop a few other courts and athletic tracks, and such possibilities may be explored.

At present College has 10 computers, one in the library, three in the office room and six in the computer room. The number of computers is to be increased in the computer room, and teaching the departments also need computers. The College has an LCD, 3 OHPs, teaching aids and charts strengthening the teaching-learning process. The College has a botanical garden and well maintained lawns. It has a cycle stand, a pump house and a gas plant. There are 15 class rooms and 5 rooms for practical classes. A Xerox machine and water cooler are added facilities.

CRITERION - V : STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

As the College is situated in one of the most backward areas of Karnataka and as there is no other College within a radius of 30 kilometers, the students from the economically backward and the depressed classes find this College the only institution to fulfill their dreams of higher education. However, the sanctioned student strength is

seldom attained, and the drop out rate is 6%. From among the graduates of this College, those who pursue postgraduate studies are only a handful. And a considerable number of students go for B.Ed. degree. Progression to higher studies and employment is 15%.

The College publishes its Prospectus annually, which carries information on rules for admission and on academic matters, fee structure, scholarships, library, extracurricular activities and available facilities.

In the academic year 2004-2005, 173 students of the College got the benefit of scholarships under different schemes like SC/ST, OBC, merit, Sanchi Honnamma, and Defence. In 2005-2006, the number of beneficiaries was 96. Besides, those who secure the highest marks in B.A III, B.Sc. III and B.Com. III get cash prize awards, instituted by philanthropists.

Two teachers have been put in charge of the student counselling. As the majority of the students are from rural backward, the student counselling Cell has a major and significant task to perform.

The Alumni Association was formed in 2003. The members are active and inclined to initiate actions to assist the College in its endeavors to march forward. The members, while feeling proud of the College, are aware of the work yet to be done to start new courses and to improve the facilities. Parents also want new courses, including postgraduate courses.

NCC (Army Wing) is active, and so far 7 old students who were cadets in the Wing got into the armed force of India. Over the last five years, 80 students secured B certificate and 31 students secured C certificate. One cadet has been selected for N.I.C camp, which will be held in Jammu in October 2006; and another cadet has been selected for "Basic Leader Camp", which will be held in Gujarat in October, 2006.

For indoor and outdoor games, facilities are available. Separate space is set apart for girl students for outdoor games. The facilities of gymnasium are yet to be made available. There are opportunities given for the development of the literary and artistic talents of the students.

CRITERION - VI : ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The College is governed by the Hyderabad Karnataka Education Society, which has a wide experience of running institutions of medical, engineering, dental, pharmacy, nursing and basic degree courses in different parts of Karnataka. The office bearers of the Governing Council of the society are elected for a period of 3 years. The Governing Body of the College nominated by the Governing Council of the Society comprises the Convenor, 2 members and the Principal as the Ex-officio Secretary. The Administrator acts as a link between the Management and its various Colleges. The Principal is the academic and administrative Head of the College, who appoints several Committees of teachers for smooth functioning of the College. The Committees are constituted for timetable, examinations, library, students welfare, sports and games, cultural and co-curricular activates.

The staff-in-charge for student welfare looks after the genuine grievances of the students. The meritorious students are nominated on the students union. The grievances, if any, of the teaching and non-teaching staff members are primarily attended to by the concerned Head of the Department and the Principal.

The tution fee for the students is Rs. 1,170 per year. The unit cost of education, with and without salary component are Rs. 974 and Rs.14,500 respectively. The College has its internal audit mechanism.

The office Manager monitors the activities of the non-teaching staff and few of them are computer literates. The permanent employees of the college are entitled for 25% concession in medical expenses for treatment in the hospital of the Society.

- The College campus is full of greenery and maintained well.
- The National Festivals, Sports Day, College Day and Founder's Day are celebrated with enthusiasm and patriotic zeal.
- The Alumni Association and Parents-Teachers Association have expressed their desire to take keen interest in the development activities of the College.
- The students are disciplined and there are no problems of students' unrest.
 However, wider exposure of students to the modern education is lacking.

SECTION - III : OVERALL ANALYSIS

The College has made efforts in complying with some of the suggestions made by carlier Peer Team in 2004. The Course in Spoken English is introduced, separate computer room is provided and audio-visual facilities have been made available. The sports facilities for girls' have been provided.
